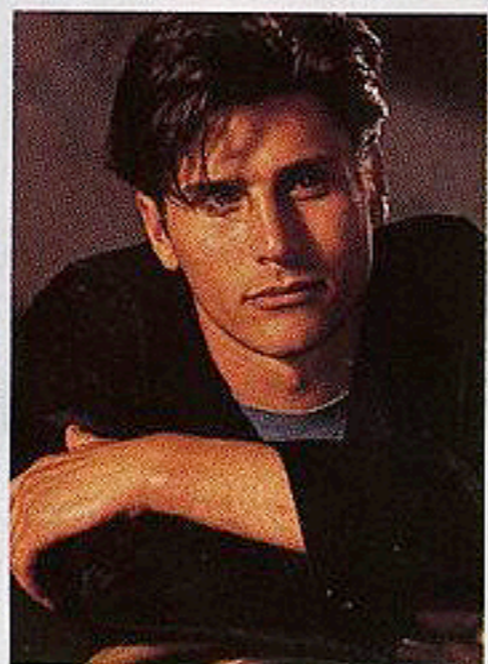
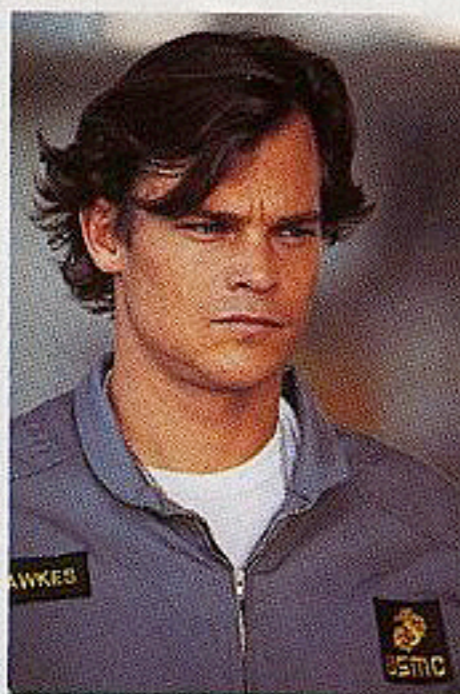

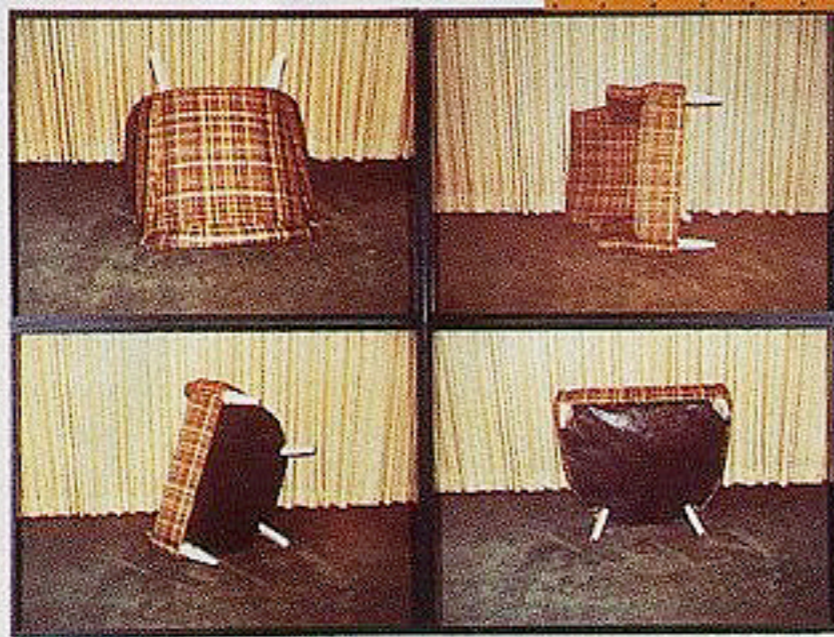
Model Actors

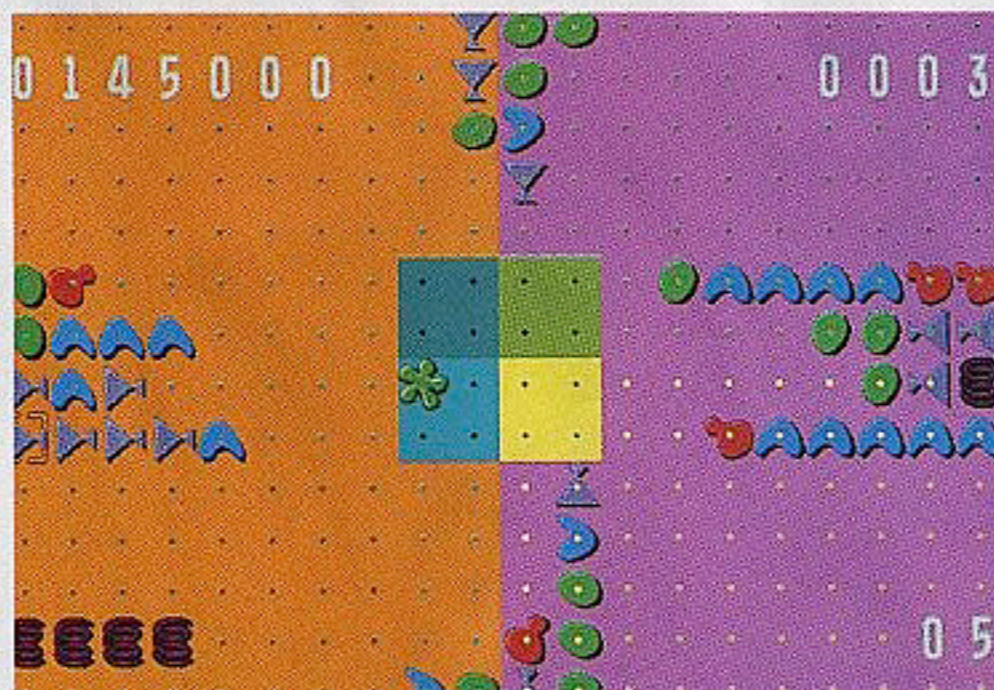
Making Sense
